CTN 0031 STAGE-12 Locks!



The STAGE-12 ((Stimulant Abuser Groups to Engage in 12 Step) protocol (CTN 0031 and 0031A) locked the trial database on June 14th, thanks to the good work of many people. They include the clinical and research staff at

RCKC, ChangePoint, Maryhaven, Gateway, Willamette Valley, CPCDS, Evergreen Manor, Dorchester, Nexus Recovery, and Hina Mauka, as well as the Pacific Northwest, Oregon/Hawaii, Ohio Valley, Florida, Appalachian Tri-State, Southern Consortium, Texas, and Pacific Nodes. Also major thanks go to the hardworking staff at DCRI and EMMES.

The STAGE-12 study was carried out at 10 sites across 8 CTN Nodes. The first participant was enrolled in February 2008. A total of 471 participants were randomized in all. Keep an eye out for many exciting papers to follow soon!

CTN 0037 STRIDE Opens for Enrollment!



The CTN 0037 STRIDE (Stimulant Reduction Intervention using Dosed Exercise) study is now open for enrollment. The Lead Team recognizes Arapahoe House in Denver, Colorado, as the first site to

be endorsed for the STRIDE trial and to screen someone for study participation. The remaining Wave 1 sites are in the process of finalizing their initiation site visits from the CCC.

CTN 0044 Web-delivery Starts Recruitment!



CTN-0044 Web-delivery of Evidencebased, Psychosocial Treatment for Substance Use Disorders is now enrolling participants. Three sites were endorsed to begin recruitment the

second week of June: Project Outreach (Long Island), Homeward Bound, Inc. (Texas), and Midtown Community Mental Health Center (Ohio Valley). Congratulations to Homeward Bound for having the first randomized participant! As of June 25th, 9 participants have been randomized across the three sites. The study will randomize 500 participants over the next year. The remaining seven sites will be asked to begin the endorsement process over the next several weeks – all are eager to get underway! Thanks to everyone for their hard work and commitment to the study!

Pacific Node PI Honored at CPDD



Dr. Walter Ling, Principal Investigator of the Pacific Region Node, received the 2010 NIDA International Program Award of Excellence in Mentoring at the recent College on Problems of Drug Dependency

(CPDD) 72nd annual meeting in Scottsdale, Arizona. Dr. Ling is a productive researcher whose clinical trials helped pave the way for U.S. approval of naltrexone, buprenorphine, and LAAM. Dr. Ling also has trained a generation of drug abuse researchers. Directing the Integrated Substance Abuse Programs at the University of California Los Angeles, he has helped prepare young scientists to significantly improve drug abuse research around the globe—from Australia to Europe, the Middle East, Asia, and the United States.

As Principal Investigator for the NIDA Clinical Trials Network Pacific Region Node, Dr. Ling has trained researchers and treatment providers while conducting research on psychosocial and pharmacological treatments for opiate, cocaine, methamphetamine, alcohol, and nicotine abuse. His protégés include successful NIDA grantees and former NIDA International Program fellows who were inspired by Dr. Ling: many of them have followed his example by building productive research and training centers, particularly in China and Thailand. Congratulations!

CTN Results at the American Pain Society Meeting



The American Pain Society 29th Annual Scientific Meeting was held in Baltimore, Maryland, in May 2010. Patients with chronic pain and prescription opioid addiction are at risk

of receiving inadequate care, say experts. Specialists outlined how to strike the delicate balance between treating symptoms without fanning the flames of addiction in patients who are struggling.

Jennifer Sharpe Potter, PhD, from the University of Texas Health Sciences Center at San Antonio, presented data on patient characteristics from the Prescription Opiate Addiction Treatment Study (POATS CTN 0030). The analysis included 274 patients with chronic pain. The trial involved a 1-month drug taper followed by a 3month stabilization period for those who did poorly during the initial taper.

Dr. Potter reported that most patients first started taking opioids to treat pain and not to get high. Although some continued taking the medication for pain, most continued to take the drugs inappropriately to avoid withdrawal symptoms. Almost half of the patients had a successful treatment response at week 12, but this benefit decreased again once the medications were tapered. The researchers found that reducing opioid use, whether initially or after a period of substantial improvement, led to nearly universal relapse. "The take-home message is really that pain is a chronic relapsing disorder and must be treated as such," Dr. Potter said.

Impact of Attention-Deficit/Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) Treatment on Smoking Cessation Intervention in ADHD Smokers: A Randomized, Double-Blind, Placebo-Controlled Trial by Theresa Winhusen, Eugene Somozoa, Greg Brigham, et al.

Journal of Clinical Psychiatry 2010 (in press). This article reports on the **primary outcomes of protocol CTN 0029**, which evaluated whether or not using osmotic-release methylphenidate to treat ADHD enhances response to smoking cessation treatment in smokers with ADHD.



Association of Race and Ethnicity with Withdrawal Symptoms, Attrition, Opioid Use, and Side-Effects During Buprenorphine Therapy by E. Sherwood Brown, Carlos

Tirado, Abu Minhajuddin, et al. Journal of Ethnicity in Substance Abuse 2010;9(2):106-114. This ancillary investigation of data from protocol CTN 0003 (Bup/ Nx Taper) examined racial/ethnic differences before and during stabilization with buprenorphine and found that **race/ethnicity may not play a major role in buprenorphine response** and treatment retention.



<u>Gender Differences in the Rates and</u> <u>Correlates of HIV Risk Behaviors Among</u> <u>Drug Abusers</u> by Audrey Brooks, Christina Meade, Jennifer Sharpe Potter, et al. Substance Use & Misuse 2010 (in press).

This ancillary investigation of data from protocols CTN 0001, 2, 5, 6, and 7, examined gender differences in the rates and correlates of HIV risk behaviors, finding distinct differences between men and women, which highlights the need for more gender-specific risk-reduction interventions.



<u>The Role of Alcohol Misuse in PTSD</u> <u>Outcomes for Women in Community</u> <u>Treatment: A Secondary Analysis of NIDA's</u> <u>Women and Trauma Study</u> by Denise Hien,

Aimee Campbell, Lesia Ruglass, et al. Drug and Alcohol Dependence 2010 (in press). This secondary analysis of data from the Women & Trauma protocol (CTN 0015) examined individuals with co-morbid substance use and PTSD and found that the *Seeking Safety* treatment model may be a sound first-line clinical approach to managing PTSD among women with active alcohol misuse.

Can Prisoners be paid for study participation? If so, how much?



In non-prison settings, paying subjects to participate in research is considered ethically acceptable, so long as it is commensurate with the discomfort and/or inconvenience involved. Paying "prisoners" (defined as individuals who are incarcerated in a penal facility) who are enrolled in a study the same amount that

would be paid to non-prisoners may, however, be seen as unduly influential in a setting where inmates can earn only a small fraction of that amount for any other "work" activity.

However, paying "prisoners" as defined above, a fraction of what would be paid to non-prisoners can be seen as exploitative. One suggestion that has been offered is to require that investigators pay "prisoners" at the same rate as they would pay non-prisoners, but that individuals would receive an amount comparable to that paid for other prison-based tasks. The difference would be paid into a general prison fund, to be used, for instance, to subsidize the wages paid to all prisoners, or to be used for educational or recreational purposes (to be determined by the prison population, not the administrators). Alternatively, the difference could be paid into an escrow account, to be distributed to the "prisoner" upon release from the penal facility or to be paid to the prisoner's family. Keep in mind, however, individuals who are not incarcerated in a penal facility and who may be court mandated to therapy or other type of restriction outside of a penal facility may be paid to participate in research and this payment can be considered ethically acceptable.
