#### **CTN 0052 Completes Data Meeting**



The Lead Team for CTN 0052, Buspirone for Relapse Prevention in Adults with Cocaine Dependence (BRAC), convened on May 2-3, 2012, to review data collection procedures for

this upcoming study. Members of the Ohio Valley Lead Node joined with representatives from NIDA CCTN, the Data and Statistics Center (DSC2), and the Clinical Coordinating Center (CCC) to review each study CRF and other administrative forms in the database. Through this process, the team identified a number of ways in which the data system will be able to streamline some procedures, making the study easier for the research teams. #### Southern Consortium – Nyswander-Dole Award



Southeast ATTC South Carolina Program Manager and CTN collaborator, Ed Johnson, was one of eight individuals who received the Nyswander-Dole Award at

the Awards Banquet during the 2012 American Association for the Treatment of Opioid Dependence (AATOD) Conference "Recovery for Patients, Families and Communities," which was held April 21-25, 2012 in Las Vegas, Nevada. This is the first time that an individual from South Carolina has been chosen to receive this award. The award is named after Drs. Marie Nyswander and Vincent Dole, who pioneered the use of medication in the treatment of opioid dependence, and is affectionately referred to as the "Marie Award". The award was first presented in 1983 to recognize extraordinary work and service in the field of treatment for opioid dependence. The award acknowledges efforts in patient advocacy, stigma reduction, improving quality of care and increasing access to care. Individuals are nominated by their state opioid treatment providers group and selected by the Awards Committee of the AATOD Board of Directors.

Prior to joining the staff at Southeast ATTC, Ed was the Program Administrator for the Opioid Treatment Program at Charleston Center (Charleston County Department of Alcohol and Other Drug Abuse Services) located in Charleston, South Carolina for the previous ten years. He has worked with opioid dependent individuals and with individuals with substance use disorders and HIV disease for over for over twenty-three years. He is the immediate Past President of the South Carolina Association of Alcohol and Drug Abuse Counselors (SCAADAC) and represents South Carolina on the AATOD Board of Directors. Congratulations Ed!

#### <u>Two New Blending Products</u> HIV Rapid Testing in Substance Abuse Treatment Programs: Resources to Support On-Site Rapid Testing



Recent advances in rapid HIV testing technology make HIV testing readily accessible, with fast results. Test results can be obtained onsite in as few as 1 - 20 minutes allowing individuals to receive information about their HIV status right away. This allows them to get the care they need to slow the progression of their disease and to take precautionary

measures and medications that help prevent the spread of the HIV virus. This product details the findings of a recent NIDA study of rapid testing in drug treatment clinics and provides research results, informational videos, and resources for implementing on-site rapid HIV testing.

#### The Prescription Opioid Addiction Treatment Study (POATS): Treatment Strategies for Prescription Opioid Dependence and Information



Opioids have been used for decades to treat chronic pain; however, concerns about prescription opioid abuse have increased in recent years. Findings from a study conducted by NIDA's National Drug Abuse Treatment Clinical Trials Network (CTN) indicated that prescription opioid-dependent

patients are most likely to reduce opioid use during buprenorphine/naloxone treatment with relatively brief weekly medical management visits. This supports the national trend toward treatment of opioid dependence by physicians in office-based practice. This product offers information to treatment providers aimed at improving outcomes among patients treated for prescription opioid dependence and includes a training program and manual, PowerPoint presentation, buprenorphine treatment research, and resources.

#### News from Appalachian Tri-State Node (ATS)



West Virginia University's Department of Behavioral Medicine and Psychiatry, and Chestnut Ridge Hospital CTP of the Appalachian Tri-State Node are hosting the 23<sup>rd</sup> annual West Virginia Addiction Training

Institute (WV ATI) from June 11-15<sup>th</sup>. The goal is to provide updated evidence-based addiction training to clinicians, nurses, therapists, social workers, criminal justice personnel and students in the Tri-State area. Their WV ATI was initially started with the help of a SAMHSA training grant, but over time, it has become a self-sustaining entity. Their program includes plenary presentations and clinical workshops on a diverse range of addiction related topics and clinical interventions. #### News from the Greater NY Node



The 8th publication from the Infections and Substance Abuse Study (CTN-0012) will be published in the June issue of the Journal of Substance Abuse Treatment (Volume 42:438-445), the article is titled "Hepatitis B

virus and hepatitis C virus services offered by substance abuse treatment programs in the United States."

The Posthumous lead author was Edmund Bini, MD, MPH. Co-authors were Steven Kritz, MD, Lawrence S. Brown, Jr., MD, MPH, FASAM (originator and Lead Investigator for the study), Jim Robinson, MEd, Don Calsyn, PhD, Don Alderson, MS, Kathlene Tracey, PhD, Patrick McAuliffe, MBA, LADC (deceased), Cheryl Smith, MD, and John Rotrosen, MD (co-Principal Investigator of the Greater NY Node).

This study is still the only CTN study to originate from and be led by a CTP, the Addiction Research and Treatment Corporation, Brooklyn, NY.
